My Lord Mayor,

Dear Sir,

I have received a postcard from my husband, The J.W. Agar 4781, 4<sup>th</sup> Dragoon Guards, who is a prisoner of war in Doberitz, Germany. He wishes me to express his gratitude to you and to Mr. O. Rowntree for the kind thought which prompted this gift of chocolate etc, which he has received quite safely.

I was pleasantly surprised to get this postcard as the prisoners in this camp have only been allowed to



write once in 50 days, but  
my husband says that they  
are to be allowed to write  
every fortnight from now.  
They may receive as many  
postcards and parcels as  
we care to send. He also  
acknowledges the receipt of  
an international money order  
which I sent him just before  
Xmas. I think from this we  
may conclude that it is  
through some inaccuracy or  
carelessness of the senders  
that all prisoners have not  
received their parcels & p. es.  
Once more let me express my  
husband's & my own gratitude  
to you. I am sir

**Chocolate Letter #3: John William Agar**

John William Agar was captured on 24th August 1914 and held captive in Germany.  
John survived the war and was repatriated 21st November 1918.
